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Cochrane Wins Southern

TENNESSEE AMATEUR CAPTURES INTER-STATE HANDICAP AT MEMPHIS WITH 97 FROM 19 YARDS

S. A. Huntley and A. B. Richardson Tie for Amateur Average on 16-Yard Targets and Former Is High Over All—J. I. Chipley Takes the Preliminary Honors.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 14.—The tenth Southern Handicap tournament of the Interstate Association, decided over the traps of the Memphis Gun Club, on May 11, 12 and 13, established itself in the trap shooting records as the finest event of its kind ever held in the Southland. Not only did the attendance all through come close to record figures, but the record for Southern Handicap scores was broken, the averages ranged higher than ever before in such an event, and the competition all through the week was exceptionally keen and interesting. The Southern Handicap event, the premier contest of the year in the South, was taken by W. H. Cochrane, of Bristol, Tenn., who smashed 97 out of 100 from 19 yards, this being a new record for Southern Handicaps. J. I. Chipley, of Greenwood, S. C., had the honor of taking the Preliminary Handicap with a score of 92 out of 100 from the 18-yard mark. The championship event had an entry list of actual competitors of 146, this being not far from the record set last season.

FOR THE AMATEUR AVERAGE ON 16-YARD TARGETS,

A. B. Richardson, of Dover, Del., and S. A. Huntley, of Omaha Neb., tied with 342 out of 350. George L. Lyon and Woolfolk Henderson were tied for third with 335; J. H. Noel, 333; J. N. Knox, 332; A. J. Hill, 327; J. W. Bell, 326; W. L. Henderson and J. R. Livingston, 325; R. A. King, W. Williams and J. K. Warren, 324; J. B. Snowden, H. N. Bellinger, and B. H. Finley, 323; and W. H. Cochrane, 322, following in order. On all targets, including handicaps, S. A. Huntley was high over all, with 523 out of 550, this including 200 targets from 23 yards, a really remarkable average. This victory carried with it the handsome trophy presented by the Board of Trade of Columbus, Ga. In the professional division, C. G. Spencer led on 16-yard targets with 342 out of 350, and on all targets with 521 out of 550. Long runs were numerous. In this respect A. B. Richardson was the star. He had consecutive breaks of 119, 113, 54 and 53. Among the other noteworthy records of the tournament was the score of 95 out of 100 from the extreme distance of 23 yards, made by George Lyon in the Southern Handicap event, when he finished second, and 96 from 23 yards in the same event by

Campbell, and Secretary Ed Crook, of the Memphis Gun Club, had prepared matters so well that the arrangements brought nothing but praise. W. O. Le Compte and G. H. Hillman, both of Nashville, Tenn., were cashier and compiler of scores, respectively, and C. A. North looked after the traps in his usual able manner.

RECORD CROWD PRACTICE DAY

The field that gathered practice day was a most brilliant one, the stars entered representing men who have taken titles ranging from the National Amateur Champion down to some half-dozen or more State Champions. The 97 entrants on practice day marked the largest crowd ever competing on inaugural day at a Southern trap shooting tournament. Charles G. Spencer, who won the Southern Handicap when that feature was open to professionals and amateurs, was the highest of these honor men. Spencer had 96. He was tied with R. A. King, of Delta, Colo.; J. H. Noel, of Nashville; C. C. Hawkins, of Memphis, and W. R. Crosby, a trade representative, from O'Fallon, Ills. Bart Williams, a most consistent man usually, dropped three at the very outset, but tied with 94 when J. B. Duncan and B. H. Finley, of Memphis, and G. M. L. Key, Mississippi, made similar scores. G. B. Cragg and F. G. Bills, professionals, together with F. M. George, an amateur, of Monroe, La., were tied for sixth position with 93 broken targets. Following this came five with scores of 92, six with 91 and four with 90. The "Little Joker" trap was an added attraction and gave the contestants an opportunity to try their skill between events. This trap furnished much amusement and always attracted a large gallery of spectators. Scores:


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Stars of Southern Handicap Tourney

Laslie, of Tuskegee, Ala., for the Southern Handicap, at Charlotte, N. C.
